The Series with Tennessee

Overall - First Meeting

Of Note - This will be the first meeting between the two schools. The Old Spice Classic marks the second straight season Siena has competed in an in-season Tournament. The Saints went 1-1 in the NIT Season Tip-Off last Year, losing to Syracuse and defeating Fairleigh Dickinson. In 2004-05 Siena took part in the BCA Classic in Raleigh, N.C. losing all three of its games. Siena's last in-season Tournament Championship came in December of 1998 when the program captured the Pepperdine Sparklets Invitational title with wins over Eastern Michigan and the host Waves. This is the third straight season a MAAC school has participated in the Old Spice Classic. Last year, Rider finished sixth. The Broncs defeated Penn State and lost to North Carolina State and Kansas State. In the 2006 event, Marist finished third posting wins over Minnesota and Western Michigan while losing to Arkansas.

Siena vs. the SEC

Siena is 2-2 all-time against the 12 schools that currently make up the Southeastern Conference. In its most recent meeting with an SEC member, Siena blasted Vanderbilt 83-62 in the First Round of the NCAA Tournament last season. Kenny Hasbrouck led the Saints with 30 points in the win. The Saints also defeated South Carolina 63-58 at home in the 1991 Postseason NIT. Siena lost 71-67 at Florida at the beginning of the 1988-89 season and 94-80 to Arkansas in the 1999 NCAA Tournament First Round in Denver.

Quick Hits

- ▶ Siena is 2-0 for the first time since 2003-04
 - ✓ The Saints defeated WAC Champion Boise State, 82-52, and Ivy League Champ Cornell, 74-56, at home last week
 - ✓ The Saints' 30-point win Monday night marked the program's largest margin of victory ever over a Division I school to start the year
- ▶ Siena's defense has limited the opposition to an average of 54 points so far
 - ✓ The Broncos and Big Red combined to shoot just 34.8% from the field and 22% from 3-point range against Siena's pressure defense
 - ✓ Tennessee ranks in the top-10 nationally with 93.7 points per game
- ▶ Preseason MAAC Player of the Year Kenny Hasbrouck is averaging 21 points per game and shooting 56% from the field
 - ✓ Hasbrouck made 5-8 3-pointers in Siena's first two games
 - ✓ Hasbrouck was named MAAC Player of the Week for the first time Monday
- ▶ Siena had eight players score eight points or more against Boise State and six players score six points or more against Cornell
 - ✓ Four players are averaging double figures
 - ✓ Last season three Saints (Ubiles, Hasbrouck and Franklin) averaged over 15 points per game
- ▶ Ryan Rossiter posted his first career double-double with 10 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in the Cornell win
 - ✓ McCaffery indicated Rossiter would be the team's starting center following an exceptional off-season
 - ✓ Rossiter averaged a double-double in Siena's five games on their foreign tour this summer
 - ✓ Rossiter had four of Siena's eight steals in the Cornell win
- ▶ The Saints had 21 assists in their win over Cornell
 - ✓ Last year, the team had 20 assists or more just three times
 - ✓ The Saints starting backcourt (Moore, Ubiles and Hasbrouck) have combined for 21 assists and seven turnovers
 - ✓ The rest of the team has combined for 11 assists and 19 turnovers
- ▶ Siena has out-rebounded its first two opponents
 - ✓ Siena out-rebounded just 10 of its 33 opponents last season and had a -4.3 team rebounding margin – worst in the MAAC
- ▶ The Saints pressure defense forced an average of 19 turnovers so far this season and the team is averaging 10.5 steals per game
 - ✓ Siena set a program record with 320 steals last season and ranked eighth nationally with 9.4 steals per game
- ▶ The ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll lists Siena 33rd in points received this week
 - ✓ Siena has 10 points in the poll and 18 in the AP Poll, which placed the Saints tied for 35th among schools receiving votes
 - ✓ Three teams in the Old Spice Class are in the top-12 of the poll, including the Vols who check in at #12
- ▶ Junior Cory Magee (concussion) has not played in either of the first two games and head coach Fran McCaffery indicated Magee would not make the trip this week
 - ✓ Senior captain Josh Duell (Achilles') played sparingly the first two games, but is expected to be available for the Tournament
- ▶ Tennessee is one of at least six non-conference opponents Siena will face this season that advanced to the 2008 NCAA Tournament
 - ✓ Other 2008 NCAA Tournament opponents include: Boise State, Cornell, Pittsburgh, Saint Joseph's and defending Champion Kansas
 - ✓ Siena will likely face at least one more 2008 NCAA Tournament participant in the Old Spice Classic and potentially another on BracketBusters' weekend
 - ✓ This is one of at least seven nationally televised games Siena will play this season

Meeting with McCaffery

Each week head coach Fran McCaffery meets with media to discuss Siena basketball. Below are highlights from the most recent media luncheon (11/24).



On the Team's Defensive Improvement

That was a focal point coming into this season, to try to continue where we left off (last year). Last year we did not start the season very well defensively, nor were we very good in the middle of the season, but by the end of the season we were very good.

On the Team's Rebounding Improvements

The last couple years we have been able to overcome our rebounding deficiencies because we don't turn it over, we make threes and we have a lot of guys who can score the ball. Again, with the upgrade in our schedule, rebounding was going to be something that has to be addressed. I've been saying since we got back from Italy that Rossiter is the guy. I think we saw Saturday that he is the guy.

On Tennessee

They're a very impressive team. When you look at their team, that's the first thing that jumps out at you. I think they've got three pros – (Wayne) Chism, (Tyler) Smith and (Scotty) Hobson, without a doubt. That immediately gets our attention when you're watching film. You have players who can make plays who are obviously different than the average person. They can make a plan, and they can make plays when the team really needs them to. They have a really good point guard. They have size coming off the bench. They play a very unique style. (Head coach Bruce Pearl) sticks with the things they do well. They're going to press, they're going to run the baseline screening action and post you up. We've got to get back. They are a phenomenally athletic team that probably capitalizes on your mistakes as well as any team I've ever seen.

On playing three games in four days

For us it's particularly problematic, because it's a four-game road trip. And then we play Albany Saturday (Dec. 5). It's a lot of scouting for the assistants. Adam (Chaskin) had Cornell, he has Wichita State, he has Maryland and he has Loyola. That's a lot of tape review for him. Mitch (Buonoguro) has Tennessee, Michigan State and he's got Albany. When you're paying Thursday, Friday, Sunday, your main focus is Thursday and Friday. You regroup on Saturday no matter who it is, because in tournament situations you can live scout and we will have seen whoever we play Sunday twice in person. This is the most unique scouting situation. We will not address anyone other than Tennessee until we get to Thursday night.

On whether the team is an offensive team or a defensive team

Right now, we're doing both equally well. That's probably the first time I could say that since I've gotten here. We've always been an offensive team. You look at Cornell, we couldn't get it in the basket for the first 15 minutes. It wasn't because we didn't have good shooters taking good shots. We just weren't making them. The fact that we were still ahead at halftime, despite our offensive struggles, was impressive. In the second half, a lot of our offense was generated from our defense.

On whether the team now understands the focus needed to play good defense

It appears that way. I'm typically pretty calm. Last year, I really lost it a few times with our defensive breakdowns. It started in the scrimmages. The reason you have the scrimmages is they're dress rehearsals, so you don't make those mistakes when the games start. Well we were making the same mistakes in the beginning of January that we were making in October in our scrimmages. That's just unacceptable. That's what I pointed out to the team in no uncertain terms. The most since I've gotten here that I've ever gone off was after the game at Manhattan last year.

On strategy for the Old Spice Classic

What I will do is try to win the Tournament. In order to win the tournament you have to win the first game. You play the first game to win, and you survive to play in the championship bracket Friday, and the same holds true for Sunday. I think it's safe to say we have a pretty solid nine-man rotation.

On NBA scouts at the Old Spice Classic

There's going to be a zillion. It's just so much easier to send somebody to one place. You go to Maui, there will be a bunch of them there. This is the highest-rated tournament, so there will be the most players to watch here. They're all going to watch Hasbrouck, Ubiles and Franklin, but they want to see them against Tyler Smith and Scotty Hobson.

Scouting Siena

The defending MAAC Champions began their most anticipated season in school history strong, defeating WAC Champion Boise State and Ivy League Champion Cornell at home last week. The Saints topped the Broncos 82-52 in their season-opener, marking their largest margin of victory to start the year ever over a Division I foe. Cornell provided a stiffer test, but Siena used a 15-1 run in the second half to build a 19-point advantage and ultimately claimed a 74-56 decision. As impressive as Siena's offense was, the defense stole the show in the two wins. The Saints held their first two opponents well under 40% from the field and out-rebounded both teams. Last year, Siena's opponents shot 45% from the field and the Saints were out-rebounded by an average of nearly five boards per contest. Preseason MAAC Player of the Year Kenny Hasbrouck enjoyed two fine games to start the season. Hasbrouck led all scorers in both contests, averaging 21 points and shooting 63% from 3-point range on the week. Freshmen Kyle Downey and Owen Wignot also showed that they can, and likely will, contribute greatly to Fran McCaffery's veteran-laden lineup. Downey averaged 10.5 points on the week and Wignot had eight points and seven boards in the opener.

Scouting Tennessee

The defending SEC Champions are 3-0 and averaging 93.7 points per game. Their most recent win, a 76-66 decision over highly regarded Middle Tennessee on the road came Friday evening. Junior guard Tyler Smith had a double-double in the win; he is averaging a team-best 19.3 points to go along with his 4.6 and six rebounds per contest. Five Vols are averaging double-figures. Red-shirt freshman Cameron Tatum is tied for second on the team in scoring with junior J.P. Prince at 11.7 points per game. Junior Wayne Chism and freshman Scotty Hopson check in next with 11.0 and 10.7 points per game respectively. Tennessee owns a +25.6 scoring margin through its first three games. The Vols are shooting 54% from the field, but just 32% from 3-point range.

Hasbrouck Honored

Kenny Hasbrouck was named MAAC Player of the Week for the first time in his career on Monday. The Preseason Player of the Year averaged 21 points and shot 56% from the field and 63% from 3-point range in a 2-0 week for the defending MAAC Champions. He scored 20 points in the Saints season-opening win over WAC Champion Boise State on 7-10 shooting in just 24 minutes of action. In Siena's win over defending Ivy League Champion Cornell, Hasbrouck again led all scorers with 22 points. He averaged 5.5 rebounds, three assists and 1.5 steals on the week as well.

Room for Improvement

Although the Saints have been dominant over their first two games, there are signs that the team could be even better. Last year's leading scorer Edwin Ubiles has averaged just 10 points and 4.5 rebounds over the first two games, though he has played superb defense. Senior captain Josh Duell has averaged only 7.5 minutes the first two games and is yet to score. And sharp-shooting sophomore Clarence Jackson has made just 3-10 3-pointers on the season.

MAAC Daddies

Siena is the unanimous choice to win the MAAC this season, according to the Preseason Coaches' Poll released October 28. It's the second straight year Siena was picked to win the league. Last year, Siena shared the regular-season title with Rider and defeated the Broncs in the MAAC title game. Senior Kenny Hasbrouck was named Preseason MAAC Player of the Year and juniors Edwin Ubiles and Alex Franklin were selected to the Preseason First Team. Hasbrouck and Ubiles were First Team All-League selections last year.

Great Expectations

Not only are the Saints the unanimous choice to repeat their MAAC Championship and return to the NCAA Tournament, but national expectations surrounding the program are as high as they have ever been. Siena is receiving votes in both the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' top-25 poll and the Associated Press writer's top-25 poll. Several national magazines and websites have Siena ranked among the top-50 teams in their preseason polls. Hasbrouck was honored as the MAAC Preseason Player of the Year, while Ubiles and Franklin were named to the MAAC First Team.

Foreign Engagements

The Saints got a jump start on the season with a 13-day, five game foreign tour August 16-29. Tour stops included: Como, Venice, San Marino, Florence, Siena and Rome. In addition to the once-in-a-lifetime experiences involved with visiting historic sites such as: Vatican City, the Grand Canal, Michelangelo's David, The Coliseum and many more, the team got a chance to bond with one another and tone their basketball skills against professional competition. Sophomores Clarence Jackson and Ryan Rossiter led the Saints to a 4-1 record on the trip. Jackson averaged nearly 20 points per game and Rossiter averaged a double-double.

Anyone, Anytime

The Saints have assembled the most challenging schedule in the 66-year history of Siena basketball. Tonight's game with 2008 NCAA Tournament participant Boise State tips off an arduous non-conference slate. The Saints have already played two teams that advanced to last year's NCAA Tournament (Cornell and Boise State) and face a third in Tennessee Thanksgiving Day. Georgetown, Wichita State, Maryland, Michigan State, Oklahoma State and Gonzaga loom as potential opponents on the second and third day of competition at the Old Spice. The Saints also face National Champion Kansas (1/6), preseason top-10 selection Pittsburgh (12/18) and 2008 NCAA Tournament participant St. Joseph's (12/28). Siena will have seven games nationally televised this season.

Kenny's Quest

Kenny Hasbrouck already stands seventh on the school's all-time scoring charts with 1,447 career points. Should Siena play its minimum scheduled 31 games, Hasbrouck would need to average just over 19 points to become the school's third 2000-point scorer. If the Saints reach the MAAC finals, Hasbrouck would need to average 18 points over the 32 remaining games. Hasbrouck is fourth on the school's career steals charts with 182, 49 shy of all-time leader Marcus Faison '00.

Hot on His Heels

Edwin Ubiles has the second most points for any Siena player ever entering his junior campaign. Hasbrouck entered his junior season with 859 and Ubiles had nearly 100 more with 954. Ubiles would just need to improve slightly on his 14.5 points per game average in his final two seasons (assuming the Saints play a similar number of games) to reach the 2000-point plateau. Ubiles enters today's game just 26 points shy of 1,000 career points.

Moore Honored...Finally

Junior Ronald Moore has been selected as one of 31 finalists for the Bob Cousy award, presented annually to the nation's top point guard by the Basketball Hall of Fame. Moore has averaged 5.1 assists over his first two years and just 2.1 turnovers per game. Despite his gaudy numbers, and the fact that he makes the MAAC's top offense go, he has never been selected to an All-Conference MAAC team. Moore is the only MAAC point guard to be named a Cousy finalist. He has averaged 5.5 assists in the first two games.

A's for Alex

Alex Franklin joined Ubiles and Hasbrouck on the Preseason MAAC first team this year after earning second team recognition as a sophomore. Franklin scored 15 points on 6-7 shooting in the Cornell win. As a sophomore he averaged 15.1 points and 7.8 rebounds per game.

What's New

Freshmen Kyle Downey and Owen Wignot appear as if they will make a serious impact this season despite the return of Siena's veteran rotation. Downey was recruited as a shooting guard and can score from the perimeter, but he will add depth at point guard as well. In his debut, Downey was second on the team with 14 points, converting 7-8 from the line. Wignot is a combo forward and a superb athlete who has shown the ability to fill in on the inside when needed. He scored eight points and grabbed seven rebounds against Boise State. Freshman walk-on Conner Fenlon got some action in the last minute of the Boise State game as well.

Their Back

The Saints return all five starters from last season. Additionally, Siena returns 86% of its scoring from last year's MAAC Championship team. Only senior Tay Fisher (graduation), freshman Chris DeLaRosa (transfer) and junior James Carr (transfer) do not return.

Packing the Bags

Siena departed New York's Capital region for the most magical place on earth Tuesday afternoon. The team will not return until Thursday, December 4. Following the conclusion of the Old Spice Classic, the Saints head to Baltimore where they begin league play against Loyola Wednesday, December 3.
